Indian River High School Senior Paralyzed in Freak Accident

On June 23, 2010, Justin Lowe of Dagsboro, Delaware, a soon to be senior at the Indian River High School was involved in a freak accident in the rough surf at Ocean City, MD. A large wave caught and tumbled him, sending him crashing to the bottom—where the force of the wave kept him down for a prolonged period, almost drowning him. In the process, his neck was broken, leaving him paralyzed from the neck down.

Initially, Justin was airlifted to the University of Maryland Medical Center—The R. Adams Cowley Shock Trauma Center—in Baltimore, Maryland where he spent 2 1/2 weeks in the ICU and underwent two major operations and one lesser one. He was then airlifted to the Georgia-based Shepard Center, one of the top rehabilitation hospitals in the nation, specializing in medical treatment, research and rehabilitation for people with spinal cord and brain injury. There, he spent another week in the ICU. He is now stabilized, has been taken off his ventilator and feeding tube and is listed in stable condition and has begun rehabilitation. Clearly, there is a long road to recovery for Justin.

Justin was looking forward to again being a starter on the football team at the Indian River High School this fall. Now, as you might imagine, aside from Justin's family being faced with such a tragic and devastating injury to their son, they are also facing an uncertain future with unimaginable mounting expenses. Longterm treatment of a quadriplegic can run anywhere from \$100,000-400,000 on an annual basis, with needs for specially equipped van and wheelchairs costing in the range of additional \$100,000. While, fortunately, the family has health insurance, which undoubtedly will cover some of these costs, the financial implications to the family is truly staggering.

To help defray the costs of his treatment a foundation has been established: The Justin Lowe Foundation, c/o Delaware National Bank 28581 DuPont Blvd., Millsboro, DE 19966. A number of business and community members have already undertaken a number of fundraising efforts, and have made donations to assist the family in paying the mounting bills. Several of these initiatives were undertaken by State Representative Gerald Hocker and his employees.

On Monday, August 9th, the Fenwick Island Lions Club board of directors voted to contribute \$1,000 to the Justin Lowe Foundation. Also at that meeting, the board unanimously recommended that the Club apply to both the Delaware Lions Foundation and the Kusiak Lions Youth Foundation for matching funds.

This is truly a tragic accident that has stricken this family and it is hoped that Lions Clubs throughout the State will consider providing support to the family, in one way or another.

This Leo Club was established by the Fenwick Island Lions Club, its sponsor, in 2003 and has grown each year and now has in excess of 100 members. Its goals are as stated in its name—which is an acronym

standing for: Leadership -Leos develop skills organizers, time managers and motivators of their peers: **Experience** - Leos learn the importance of cooperation through community service; and **Opportunity** Membership provides young people with a chance to excel, to develop positive character traits. and receive recognition for their contributions to the community.

Last year a total of 55 Leos took part in one or more of eleven different activities and spent in excess of 400 hours serving their community. These activities included helping park cars at the Little League Senior Girls World Series, assisting at several Fenwick Island Lions Club

functions, serving at the Lions Visually Impaired Christmas Party and making angels for the guests, making Spring cards for the elderly, providing eye screening at Delaware's Special Olympics and working on a project for service members serving in Afghanistan.

The purpose of the meeting was to be sure that the officers understood their respective responsibilities within the Club, to review current club activities and 'brain storm' about other ways to involve their members in serving the community. Also on the agenda was a discussion on ways of making the club more vibrant by encouraging more involvement of its members, making good use of meeting time and establishing better ways to communicate with its members, such as through Facebook and cell phone texting.

Selbyville Halloween Parade Raffle Sales

Once again this year, Lion and First Vice President, Jean Bertram has stepped up to organize and oversee the sales of our raffle tickets in connection with the upcoming Selbybville Halloween Parade... Recall that last year Jean's, and the Club's efforts, resulted in sales that exceeded \$5,000.

This year Jean has made arrangements to sell tickets at Warren Station, Fenwick Crab House, Happy Harry's, Ace Hardware, Food Lion, PNC Bank and Rite Aid, with sales well underway.

It should be noted that top sales honors at Warren Station (so far) goes to the formidable team of **Lion Noble Simpson and Lion Neva O'Hara**, who together sold 16 books and 18 singles on their shift... bettering the results (by one dollar) of the then reigning champions **King Lion Tom Foley and Lion Bill Neimiller**, who had sold 19 books and 3 singles.

The Ocean City Humane Society

Long-time and extremely hardworking Club member Bill Morison is also an active member of the Ocean City / Worcester County Humane Society, located in Berlin, MD. This is a non-profit group whose purpose is to find homes and loving families for stray and abandoned animals. They are what is known as a "no-kill" facility, meaning their goal is to place rather than euthanize the animals.

As an example of their work, law enforcement and shelter personnel were dispatched to a residence where it had been reported that a dog was neglected and confined to a very small area. The dog (Tucker) had not been to a vet in 9 years. He was removed from the residence and transported to the shelter. Tucker was blind and could not hear. After being treated by the vet and shelter staff Tucker can once again see and hear. He is now waiting for adoption.

Bill tells us that they rely solely on donations to care for the animals. Monetary donations can be mailed to: P.O. Box 48 Berlin, MD 21811

As a fundraiser, they are asking everyone to save "Purina Weight Circles" from any Purina product. These can be given to Bill.

They are also looking for volunteers to help in their efforts, which include:

- 1.) **Animal care** Brushing cats/dogs, walking, basic training, socializing dogs, bathing dogs, transporting animals to and from the vet;
- 2.) **Labor** Maintenance of buildings and pens-- Grounds keeping;
- 3.) Cleaning laundry, dishes, litter pans, crates, pens; and
- 4.) **Fundraising** finding sponsors, help at adoption/showcase events, handmade items (ie blankets, leashes, collars, cat/dog clothes, biscuits) to sell at Spring/Sunfest and collecting cans to recycle.

Delaware Coastal Cleanup Scheduled for September 25th

The 25th annual Delaware Coastal Cleanup is scheduled for Saturday, September 25th. And, once again our Lions Club and the Indian River Leo Club will assist in this effort. The types and quantities of trash collected are recorded on data cards and forwarded to the Center for Marine Conservation, which compiles the information for all of the cleanups held in the country and around the world. This information helps identify the source of the debris and focus efforts on eliminating or reducing it.
