Fenwick Island Lions & Delaware Lions Foundation Provide Assistance to Indian River Senior Justin Lowe

On June 23, 2010, Justin Lowe of Dagsboro, Delaware, a soon to be senior at the Indian River High School was involved in a freak accident in the rough surf at Ocean City, MD. A large wave caught and tumbled him, sending him crashing to the bottom—where the force of the wave kept him down for a prolonged period, almost drowning him. In the process, his neck was broken, leaving him paralyzed from the neck down.

Initially, Justin was airlifted to the University of Maryland Medical Center—The R. Adams Cowley Shock Trauma Center—in Baltimore, Maryland where he spent 2 1/2 weeks in the ICU and underwent two major

operations and one lesser one. He was then airlifted to the Georgiabased Shepherd Center, one of the top rehabilitation hospitals in the nation, specializing in medical treatment, research and rehabilitation for people with spinal cord and brain injuries. There, he spent another week in the ICU, was stabilized and taken off his ventilator and feeding tube and he began rehabilitation.

In September, Justin was released from the Shepherd Center and returned home to convalesce. He has resumed high school classes on a limited basis even though he is paralyzed from the neck down. He also recently attended the Indian River High School Homecoming and was recognized and honored during the halftime event at the football game.

As the summer began, Justin had been looking forward to again being a starter on the football team at the Indian River High School in the fall. Now, as you might imagine, aside from Justin's family being faced with such a tragic and devastating injury to their son, they are also facing an uncertain future with unimaginable mounting



expenses. Long-term treatment of a quadriplegic can run anywhere from \$100,000-\$400,000 on an annual basis, with needs for specially equipped van and wheelchairs costing in the range of an additional \$100,000. While, fortunately, the family has health insurance, which undoubtedly will cover some of these costs, the financial implications to the family is truly staggering.

To help defray the costs of his treatment a foundation has been established: The Justin Lowe Fund, c/o Delaware National Bank 28581 DuPont Blvd., Millsboro, DE 19966. A number of business and community members have already undertaken a number of fundraising efforts, and have made donations to assist the family in paying the mounting bills. Several of these initiatives were undertaken by State Representative Gerald Hocker and his employees.

On Monday, August 9th, the Fenwick Island Lions Club board of directors voted to contribute \$1,000 to the Justin Lowe Fund. Also at that meeting, the board unanimously recommended that the Club apply to the Delaware Lions Foundation for matching funds.

The Delaware Lions Foundation (DLF) which was established in 1974 and is governed by a board of directors of selected Lions Club members from the 35 Lions Club throughout the state of Delaware. Its mission is to support the Lions Clubs of Delaware in their humanitarian service to Delawareans through matching grants and to provide educational scholarships for Public High School seniors residing in Delaware. It derives its funds for both the matching grants and scholarships through contributions made by member Lions Clubs in Delaware and through fundraising efforts.

On November 13, 2010, the Fenwick Island Lions Club was notified by the DLF that its request for matching funds had been approved and a check for \$1,000 had been provided. The only stipulation for use of the money was that it was to be used for a specific purpose to assist in the care and well being of Justin.

Recently, the family invested in a specially equipped wheel chair, at a cost of over \$5,000, which affords Justin a measure of mobility and independence and allows him to attend classes at Indian River High School. Justin's doctors have strongly advised that the family acquire a "standup frame system." Because Justin is a paraplegic, he is constantly either in a sitting or in a prone position. The standup frame allows him to stand in a vertical position which is essential for proper blood circulation and maintaining bone density. The family has been quoted a price of approximately \$4,000 for this unit. We have pledged that funding from the DLF will be used to help off-set these costs.

LCIF beat out Rotary International, Habitat for Humanity, UNESCO, and UNICEF, to name a few.

Another important distinguishing feature—and a basic tenet of LCI and Lions Clubs throughout the world—is that 100 per cent of money raised for humanitarian service projects is used for these projects... Not one cent is used to support Club administration costs—all such expenses being the sole responsibility of club members through their dues. Birthday Wishes!
