


March comes in like a lion! Well, every month comes in like a lion to us. We continue to serve our community, and we do it with pride in our many accomplishments.

BELIZE LIONS HURRICANE RICHARD RELIEF EFFORT

Hurricane Richard had a devastating effect on parts of Belize District and the Cayo when it hit the coast of the country of Belize on October 24th, 2010. Even though no lives were lost, there were millions of dollars of destruction to houses, agriculture, and infrastructure.

Following the passage of the Hurricane, the Zone Chairman of Belize Lions Zone 59, Lion Baldemar Graniel, was successful in receiving a Hurricane Richard Emergency Grant of \$10,000 U.S. from Lions



Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). Assistance was provided to those families who were affected by the Hurricane by the distribution of food hampers and food vouchers of values of \$50 bze. -\$100 bze. (\$25 U.S. - \$50 U.S.), depending on the size of the families affected.

The food vouchers afforded the hurricane victims the opportunity to buy food items which were not received in the regular food hampers given out by other organizations. The Belize City Lions Club distributed Food Vouchers in the Belize District, while the Belmopan Lions Club preferred to distribute Food Hampers in the Cayo District.


