


PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

DELAWARE LIONS FOUNDATION AUCTION

Each year the Delaware Lions Foundation (DLF) requests that Clubs within the District provide 3-5 items which are suitable to be auctioned off. The revenue raised at this event is then used to support various DLF projects.

This year the Auction took place on October 24th at the Dover Downs Hotel & Casino and Lion Jean Bertram and Martha Stone attended with me.

Because this is such a busy time of the year and given the fact that we are already asking our local merchants to support our various fundraising efforts—including the Halloween Parade and the Spaghetti Dinner, we decided to pass around a "shoe box" at our regular meeting held on October 4th and ask for contributions for this effort. By doing this, we raised \$80 in cash—including some generous contributions from several guests attending that meeting.

This, in turn, was supplemented with items donated by Betty Foley, Jean Bertram, Martha Stone, Jodie Stone, myself, as well as a friend of FILC Patrice Pikulsky.

When all was said and done we had five baskets that were valued at over \$253. I would like to tell you we made \$253 for the DLF but that was not to be. The Foundation only collected \$142 for the five baskets. It seems as though next year we will need to re-evaluate the merits of the time and effort put forth, in light of the meager results.

YOUTH VISION SCREENING

Once again this year, Lions Jim and Carol Miles are coordinating this Club's Vision Screening Program that is designed to test for amblyopia... and other vision abnormalities in youth.

Amblyopia

A Greek word simply translated as "dull eye", and commonly referred to as "lazy eye" results from a set of childhood vision disorders that affect how the brain processes unequal or abnormal visual input from the eyes. The brain literally shuts off the bad eye and slows its development in relation to the good eye. If left uncorrected, it may lead to irreversible vision loss and most certainly will affect a child's ability to learn.

Amblyopia develops most rapidly in the early years of the child's life and affects 3% to 5% of all American children. The vision screening is accomplished using a Welch AllynSure Sight Vision Screener (*pictured in top left photo below.*) This unit was purchased with the financial assistance of the Delaware Lions Foundation and the other Lions Clubs within our Lions Zone two years ago. The system takes up to nine separate readings on each eye and immediately provides the results. If readings are beyond recommended limits, a letter is sent home to the parent recommending that the child seek the attention of an eye care professional. Additionally, under the new testing procedures a separate test, known as the Titmus Test—or butterfly test—is also administered. This is designed to test depth perception, another indicator of a vision abnormality.

October has been an extraordinarily busy month for Jim & Carol, along with other team members—Lion Ray Hamn, Lion Dave Crum, Lion Joe and Margaret Leonard and Lions Sam & Muriel Mooney. This group tested approximately 508 children at eleven separate locations during the month. Now, the screening device will be passed along to the Millsboro Lions Club, the Lord Baltimore Lions Club and finally the Laural Lions Club. When the screening is complete for this year, these Clubs will have screened well over 1,000 children. This is Lionism at its best!



SELBYVILLE HALLOWEEN PARADE
