Phil Pease, a retired employee of the National Security Agency (NSA) was our guest speaker on October 1st, 2012 at the Fenwick Island Lions Club luncheon meeting. Phil was previously a member of FILC. He was an Army Intelligence Officer before being offered a job with NSA in 1956. He has dealt with very classified material throughout his career.

Among other things, Phil informed the Lions about the process needed to work at the highest level of intelligence and with top secret material. The people considered for work at NSA have to take a polygraph test, have an extensive background check and computer knowledge. Most of them are mathematicians. If hired, they have to take the polygraph test every five years.

Following his talk, there was a question and answer period. This was a wonderful opportunity to hear about a government agency seldom discussed.

1st Annual LEO Leadership Bash at the Beach...A Big Success!

On Sunday afternoon, October 7th, after a quick change of venue caused by inclement weather, the first



annual LEO "Bash at the Beach" moved from Cape Henlopen State Park to the Dewey Beach Lions Club House and got underway. 42 LEO leaders from five LEO Clubs around the state-Caesar Rodney, Cape Henlopen, Indian River, Laurel and Milford—came to learn and have fun.

A committee, chaired by Lion Woody Stocks, planned the event that was designed to provide the leaders in the various LEO clubs with greater leadership and organizational skills.

There were 13 Lions and 5 school advisors who helped to facilitate the activities. A language interpreter was provided by the District Lions to aid a special needs LEO who wished to attend. Also in attendance was Dr. Jeffery W. Conrad, ED.D., Supervisor of Instructional Support and Special Services from the

Cape Henlopen School District.

Lions International's Past President Clement Kusiak, who heads the Lions Youth Foundation, initiated the day's events by telling the LEOs of grants available for youth projects and youth development objectives. He specifically challenged LEOS to create power point programs detailing activities of LEOS around the state.

The program continued with District Governor Richard Merriwether. He linked the International Lions Club initiatives for world literacy and the need to wipe-out measles globally with specific



activities for LEOS. He emphasized the importance of setting goals. By planning to collect books, present and read them to elementary students, Indian River LEOS are implementing one of Lions International's initiatives for the year.

The opening remarks were followed by "break-out" sessions led by Lions and others from the committee.



The topics of these sessions, each lasting ½ hour, were public speaking, publicity, leadership, fund raising and service projects. Following these workshops, the groups engaged in a competition involving team building led by Laura Quillen and Amy Hughes, both advisors for the Indian River LEO Club. Activities such as "the human knot", the "hula hoop race" and "group juggling", among others, demonstrated the necessity of working together to reach a goal as well as providing some time for fun.

Each participant received a tee shirt marking the event. An indoor picnic, provided by the Lions Clubs in our district was held before the LEOS left for the

day—no doubt with some inspiration and ideas for making their Clubs more effective and better able to serve their communities.

This year the horseshoe champs were Sam Mooney and Dick Bowman. No further comments on their win. Everyone can see from the picture, their size!




A Unique Opportunity on Thursday, November 15th... The eyes have it!

program is designed to detect, you won't want to miss this session.
